

ARTICLE I

SECTION 1

Section 1. The judicial power shall extend to all cases arising under this Constitution, but shall not extend to any case in which the State shall have been a party, or to any case of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction, or to any case affecting the title to lands owned or claimed by any State or foreign State, or to any case affecting the title to lands owned or claimed by any individual alien.

SECTION 2

Section 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases arising under this Constitution, but shall not extend to any case in which the State shall have been a party, or to any case of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction, or to any case affecting the title to lands owned or claimed by any State or foreign State, or to any case affecting the title to lands owned or claimed by any individual alien.

Section 3.
